History of the 5th Ranger Battalion

IRSCH-ZERF OPERATIONS / Part one

Taken from "Lead the Way, Rangers" by Henry S. Glassman (passed away in 2003)

February 23rd at 1630 hours in the town of Weiten Germany. The men were as restive as yearlings and indeed they should be. But a few hours previous, the six Ranger companies had been spread over an area of 11,000 yards when, bingo, the Battalion less "B" Company, received orders to assemble in Weiten as rapidly as possible. Immediately after orienting the relieving units, Companies "A, E, and F" struck out on foot while "C and D" had to be motored. The rumors of the impending job were numerous and varied, yet, despite their difference, all possessed one constant theme, "The job was to be a real Ranger one."

The men's doubts and wonderment were short-lived, for soon the mission was unraveled to all. In true Ranger conformity, the lowest private possessed as equal a knowledge as Col. Sullivan, The Battalion Commander. It was to be a 48 hour job, to cross the Saar, infiltrate the enemy lines and cut the Irsch-Zerf road. Its importance was determined by the fact is represented the nucleus for any German reinforcements and must be accomplished to any and all costs. The companies were to set off individually to "B" Company's position in the town of Rodt and were to be there by 1815 hours. Immediately, extra machine gun ammu-

munition, AT mines, and one "K" and one "D" ration per man were issued. The men were advised to grab some hot chow and to travel as light as possible. The ensuing hustle and bustle of preparation was orderly and rapid and, shortly thereafter, the 5th Ranger Battalion shoved off-on the go again. Confidence and cockiness clothed and beamed on the face of each man, yet the grimness of their eyes acutely testified to their savvy that the job would be no picnic: and, subsequent events proved that the hilt.

The latter soon bore evidence at Rodt which was under heavy artillery fire. All companies came through OK but Company "A" which suffered many casualties of which two were officers. Captain Parker of Big Stone City, SD, "A" Company placed Tech Sgts Rooney of Fairfax , VT, and Thomas of Kansas City, KS, in charge of the two platoons, and throughout, He never had a chance to regret his selection. At Rodt the Battalion was held up for an initiating two hours due to the artillery, and the fact that the other friendly units were utilizing the sole foot bridge. Finally at 2000 hours, the Battalion departed for the Saar, and, using the jitter-bugging footbridge, all Companies crossed under harassing artillery fire. To this day, the

men often thank their lucky stars that the foot-bridge held up, for with that current, and the load of each man, anyone falling in would have as much chance of safety as the proverbial "snowball in hell". Once across the river, the damnable, spirit breaking, and seemingly endless hill had to be climbed. Halts were occasionally in order to check our course, but mostly to give the men a chance to regain their breath. Despite the coolness of the evening, every man was drenched with his own sweat, and at length, after what seemed an endless climb and grind, all the companies were assembled at the top of the hill. It was then exactly 2245 hours. Here it became necessary to abandon our original plan due to the fact that the adjacent infantry had not advanced as rapidly as anticipated. No time could be wasted, however, and after a brief period of deliberation and of casualties amongst the company commanders, the Battalion moved off. A formation of two columns abreast was taken up, "C, F and A" from front to rear on the left column and "D, E, and B" constituting a column on the right. Passing through elements of the 302nd Infantry Regiment and advancing on a 10 azimuth for nine consecutive hours there after.

Last year was a very difficult year for the planners. On the day of the event the Senior planners did not have radio's or if they did they turned them down.

Mike Felmlee and I ran the battle with help from Barry (German) on the hill. We were

constantly in contact with the Higgins boats and the pyrotechnics to insure everyone's safety. We will be maintaining all the rules for safety that was implemented last year.

We need all the assistance we can get with this event for 2006. We will be requesting donations to help fund the event. I know that I can count on each and everyone of you to give all the assistance that you can.

I am looking forward to involving as many of you in the planning process that want to be involved.

Mike Owen has already volunteered to assist. Tom and Jack have been asked to make staff bands, so that we (planners) are easily recognizable.

I do want to take this time to thank each of you in advance for your patience and help.

Journal 5th Ranger Infantry Battalion, Flamingville, France 0001 1 June 1944

1 June—VOCG First Inf Div; left Dorchester England by vehicle 0700, Arrived Weymouth, England 0939, went aboard LCA's, left Weymouth Harbor arrived at and boarded HMS Leopold, Boudouin, and Prince Charles at 1045.

3 June—VOCG First Inf Div; D-Day announced, 5 June 1944, H-Hour 0610.

4 June—CO talked to Bn re-D-Day, what to expect etc. VOCG, D-Day postponed to 6 June 1944, H-Hour 0630.

5 June—1000 VOCO; get packs and all equipment set. 1300 VOCO; prime all charges. Load all crew served wps and individual equipment on LCA's. 1630 ships hoisted anchor. Joined Convoy in Channel.

6 June—0530 Embarking from HMS ships in transport area.

0545 lowered to Channel and shoved off.

0700 We are approximately 5km from the coast of France. VOC

0750 Landing on Omaha Beach, Vierville-Sur-Mer approximately 1/2 km S D-I exit.

This is the initial assault on German occupied coast of France. Enemy fire was heavy as we struggled across the beach. Casualties seemed to be heavy but this is no time for check—awaiting orders hugging beach wall.

0753 VOCG 29th Inf Div; (Lead the Way Rangers) VOCO (Co B led way—cleared path

through barbed entanglements. Co's A and F take the flanks knock out the pillboxes to our left and right. Co's C, D, E, and CP Groups “let's go get those MG's and Snipers to our front” (two hours later near Vierville-Sur-Mer) and we went over the wall and on over the burning hill at the beaches edge and pushed inward towards Vierville, under constant enemy fire machine guns, automatic pistols, sniper rifles, mortars and self propelled 88's.

1043 reaching outskirts village Vierville-Sur-Mer. Sniper fire is heavy. Two MG nests located in a building, knocked out. Infiltrating through town, snipers are thinning out rapidly: several patrols are searching building to building while the battalion is moving on cautiously.

1400 CO can't contact anyone by radio.

1935 have reached westerly outskirts of town. VOCO all around defense. No perimeter defense of the town can be established. 116th Inf has not moved up to our left. No contact can be made. CP set up in shed at town's edge. 2300 twenty three US Tanks are moving up through town and into their pre-arranged transport area, which is inside our defense.

7 June—0630 reinforced Bn assembled on road to move to Pointe Du Hoe. 0635 Heavy MG and sniper fire on col rec from left flank. CO's “E & B” and elements of “A & F with four tanks left to clear Vierville and area south; remainder of BN proceeds toward Pointe Du Hoe.

8 June—0700 MAJ Richard P Sullivan with Co's C, D, reached Pointe Du Hoe to assist

2nd Rangers.

0800 VOCG 29th Inf Div; 5th Rangers to proceed to and take Grande Camp Les Bains.

1000 Radio to VOCG; met heavy resistance, one kill south of Grand Camp, being held up by heavy mortar barrage, request support.

Radio VOCG 29th: hold present location till relieved by 116 Reg.

1730 Relieved by 116 Reg.

1920 VOCG: Grand Camp cleared of all resistance.

1930 VOCO: Co's D & E set up defense around Sleuce Gate Bridge. Remainder Bn, set up all around defense.

2400—enemy planes bombed area light 1/4 km S Grand De Camp. CP set up in abandoned German tunnel.

9 June—0500 VOCO; Co E patrols to town along beach to get stranded snipers and to get previous unlocated enemy mortar positions.

1400 Co E mission completed.

1620 VOCG; 29th Div; move through Grand Camp along road and proceed to Osmannville.

2000 arrived 1/2 kill Osmannville—set up all around defense.

2100 VOCO—Co E sent night patrol to river Vire check foot bridge leading to Cherbourg Peninsula.

2400 Mission completed. Area bombed by enemy.
